The Council of the City of Washington, Iowa, met in Regular Session in the Council Chambers, 215 East Washington Street on Tuesday, June 15, 2021 at 6:00 p.m. Mayor Rosien in the chair.

Washington Public Library Director Bryna Walker via Zoom presented an alley closure request for summer reading programs on July 10, 2021.

Mayor Rosien stated the Washington Chamber of Commerce Artfest request needed no action as it is being combined with an existing event.

Mayor Rosien presented a proclamation recognizing June 19, 2021, as Juneteenth – Freedom Day in the City of Washington in observance of the oldest known celebration of the end of slavery in the United States first observed June 19, 1865.

Mayor Rosien presented a proclamation recognizing June 25, 2021, as Marshal Aaron Bailey Day in observance of the anniversary of his line of duty death in the City of Washington. A plaque in Marshal Bailey's honor will be placed in City Hall.

The nuisance report was provided to council and no questions were received.

Presentation from the public: Dan Henderson with Washington for Justice and MUSIC Inc. invited the public and council members to attend Juneteenth activities in Central Park on June 19, 2021. Mike Murphy said thanks for burying the phone line and for installation of a traffic signs on South Avenue E, and spoke against a boulevard on the West Buchanan project. Washington YMCA CEO Amy Schulte thanked the city council for creating the Wellness Park and invited them to see it being used by youth programs. David Robbs owner of the World's Cheapest Fireworks stand spoke of a disagreement with a neighbor and assures he's working with authorities to be in compliance.

Council held discussion on the City Administrator Search Process. Mayor Rosien presented a memo with options for council to consider including having staff coordinate an administrator search, hiring a consultant to work with staff and council to search for an administrator by either a formal RFP process or authorizing a group of staff to move forward, or to wait until January 1, 2022 to begin, or to utilize an

interim city administrator. After discussion council directed staff including City Clerk Sally Hart, Finance Director Kelsey Brown, Mayor Rosien, and Police Chief Jim Lester to pursue proposals from consultants for an administrator search with timelines.

Council entered a workshop session to discuss Yard Waste Center options. Wastewater Treatment Plant Superintendent Jason Whisler answered questions from council. Mayor Jaron Rosien presented two options to fence the facility or add more staff hours with a fully supervised site. The added hours would have the yard waste center open every Saturday from April 1 to November 30 from 7-10 a.m. and Wednesdays in the peak 6 weeks in the spring and peak 6 weeks in the fall from 4-7 p.m.

Motion by Pettit-Majewski, seconded by Youngquist, to pilot the option of the supervised site with added hours and reassess it in November. Motion carried.

Departmental reports were presented.

Motion by Moore, seconded by Stigers, that the Regular Session held at 6:00 p.m. Tuesday, June 15, 2021, is adjourned at 8:10 p.m.

CITY OF WASHINGTON COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND HOUSING NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Community Development and Housing Needs of LMI Persons

The following needs have been identified by the elected and appointed officials of the City of Washington based on various budgets, capital planning sessions, and the development of a hazard mitigation plan over the past several months. Some of the needs identified here have been programmed in the City's Budget while the city is currently working on identifying appropriate resources to help make other projects a reality.

- Water System Improvements. The City has experienced several issues with their water distribution system over the past several years resulting in water quality and quantity issues for residents and businesses. A comprehensive analysis was completed by Fox Engineering which outlined long term improvements that were needed to bring the system into a state of compliance with current standards as well as put the City into a position of being able to ensure residents and businesses of a steady, reliable, and high-quality water supply. (HIGH)
- Housing Rehabilitation. The City has a need to improve the quality of the existing housing stock, especially homes owned by families who meet low-to-moderate income guidelines. The primary need is for exterior housing improvements such as roofs, siding, windows, and related items; however, other needs also exist within the community including energy efficiency needs and potentially some accessibility improvements. (MEDIUM)
- Reduction of Inflow and Infiltration in the Sanitary Sewer System. The City continues to have developed neighborhoods where there are high levels of Inflow and Infiltration (I/I) into the sanitary sewer system resulting in sewer backups and increased costs for treatment of stormwater in the City's wastewater treatment system. (HIGH)
- Wellness Park Additional Phases. The City recently completed the first phase of Wellness Park.
 Additional planning has identified additional enhancements and phases of development within the park. Improvements include lighting of fields, pond development, and other features.
 (MEDIUM)
- New Water Well. As the City looks toward the long-term stability of the City's water system, they are planning for the future need of a new well to ensure long-term stability of the water supply. (MEDIUM)
- Sunset Park Play Structure. The existing play structure in Sunset Park is older and one of the most used play areas. The City would like to install a new play structure, meeting current safety standards and to enhance the appeal of the park for residents and visitors. (MEDIUM)
- Safe Routes to Schools Sidewalks. To ensure a pedestrian friendly environment and to provide a safe walking path for children to schools the City is continuing to focus on the development of safe routes within key neighborhoods. The next phase would be part of the Lincoln Elementary School Safe Routes to School Plan. (HIGH)

Other Community Development and Housing Needs

The following identified needs of the City do not directly impact LMI individuals or neighborhoods but other parts of the Washington community or the community as a whole.

- Woodland Gates and Building. The City would like to renovate and restore the historic gates and building at the Cemetery. (MEDIUM)
- Business Park Phase 2. In order to continue the development within the business park area the City has a need to develop a paved road from Highway 1 to the southwest area of town. This would open up additional industrial lots for development. (HIGH)
- Demolition of Old Wastewater Treatment Facility. Following the construction of a new wastewater treatment facility, the City needs to remove the old facility. (MEDIUM)
- Airport Runway Lighting Improvements. The existing lights at the airport are over 30 years old
 and have enhance costs for maintenance to ensure reliability for safe use of the airport.
 Replacement of the lighting will ensure long term use of the facility in a safe and efficient
 manner. (HIGH)
- NLW Phase 2 Development. The extension of South 11th Avenue is needed, along with the extension of utilities, to facilitate the development of new multi-family lots.
- Street Improvements. Several streets in the City are in need of either an asphalt overlay or complete reconstruction. (HIGH)
- Downtown Streetscape Improvements. The next step in the overall enhancements to the City square area is need to enhance the key central business district and gathering areas of the community. Improvements include, street reconstruction, utility updates, and sidewalk improvements. (HIGH)

Planned or Potential Activities to Address Housing and Community Needs

As of this time the City has not identified a planned activity to address all of the above identified needs; however, the City is currently working toward achieving the identified needs in the following ways:

- Water System Improvements. The City is moving forward with a phased approached to resolving
 problems within the water distribution system, prioritizing on those areas that have the largest
 potential to impact that largest amount of users and where improvements will have greater
 citywide results. The City plans to apply for Community Development Block Grant funding to
 help with funding the improvements.
- Housing Rehabilitation. The City is looking at potential programs that can assist residents in the
 improvements to their homes, especially low-to-moderate income residents. The City is
 considering an application to IEDA for CDBG funds to assist in improving the homes of low-tomoderate income residents.
- Reduction of Inflow and Infiltration in the Sanitary Sewer System. Following earlier phases of
 work within the collection system the City continues to plan for and identify funding for projects
 that will continue to make improvements in neighborhoods throughout the City.
- Wellness Park Additional Phases. The success of Phase 1 has spurred additional desire to continue the momentum of the other phases of the park. The City is budgeting funds in their

Capital Improvements Plan and seeking additional grant funds to help with the construction of the next phases of development.

- New Water Well. The City is evaluating the condition of the existing wells and the ability of the
 newest well to ensure that they can plan for future well development in locations and depths that
 provide strategic value to the overall water source mix that is needed to ensure the best water
 quality for residents and businesses.
- Sunset Park Play Structure. This project has been identified in the City's Capital Improvement Plan for future purchase and installation. The City is also considering other funding sources for this improvement.
- Safe Routes to Schools Sidewalks. The City is working with other local community partners to help identify potential funding sources for this project while setting aside funds from available resources within the City.
- Woodland Gates and Building. The City is planning to utilize a State grant to help fund the historic restoration of these National Historic Register listed elements of the cemetery. Once grant funds are available the City has the project budgeted.
- Business Park Phase 2. The City is budgeting funds from available resources and working to identify alternative funding sources to help with the construction of these improvements.
- Demolition of Old Wastewater Treatment Facility. A portion of this project may be able to be facilitated by City crews; however, a significant portion will be done by an outside demolition contractor. The project is listed in the City's Capital Improvement Plan.
- Airport Runway Lighting Improvements. This project has been identified in both the City's Capital Improvement Plan as well as the Airport's Layout Plan as a needed improvement project. The City is working with their Airport Engineer to obtain federal funding for the project.
- NLW Phase 2 Development. The City is working to identify funding resources to help with the
 construction of this phase of the development while also working with private developers to
 facilitate the development of new residential units.
- Street Improvements. The City continues to work toward the overall improvement of streets
 within the community including a number of projects within its long-term planning documents,
 including the City's Capital Improvement Plan. In addition, the City is researching other
 potential funding sources for projects to help increase the number of projects that they can
 complete over time.
- Downtown Streetscape Improvements. This project is listed in the City's Capital Improvement Plan. The City is working to set aside funds and identify potential funding sources for the improvements to help completed the next phase of the overall project.
