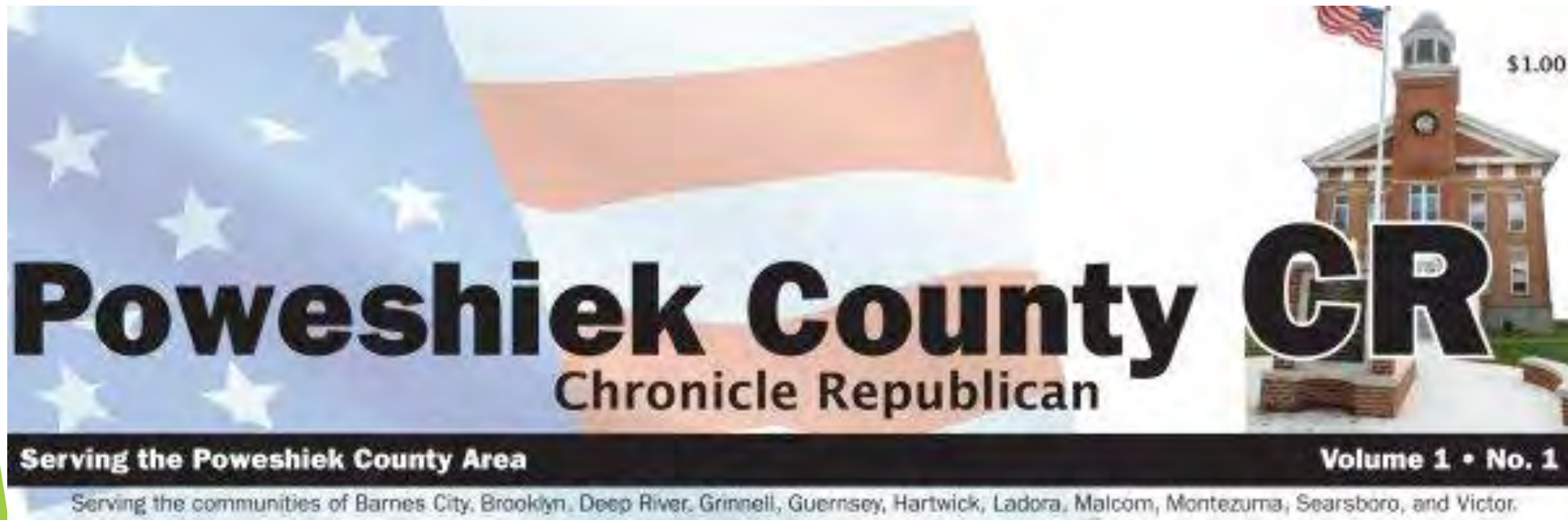

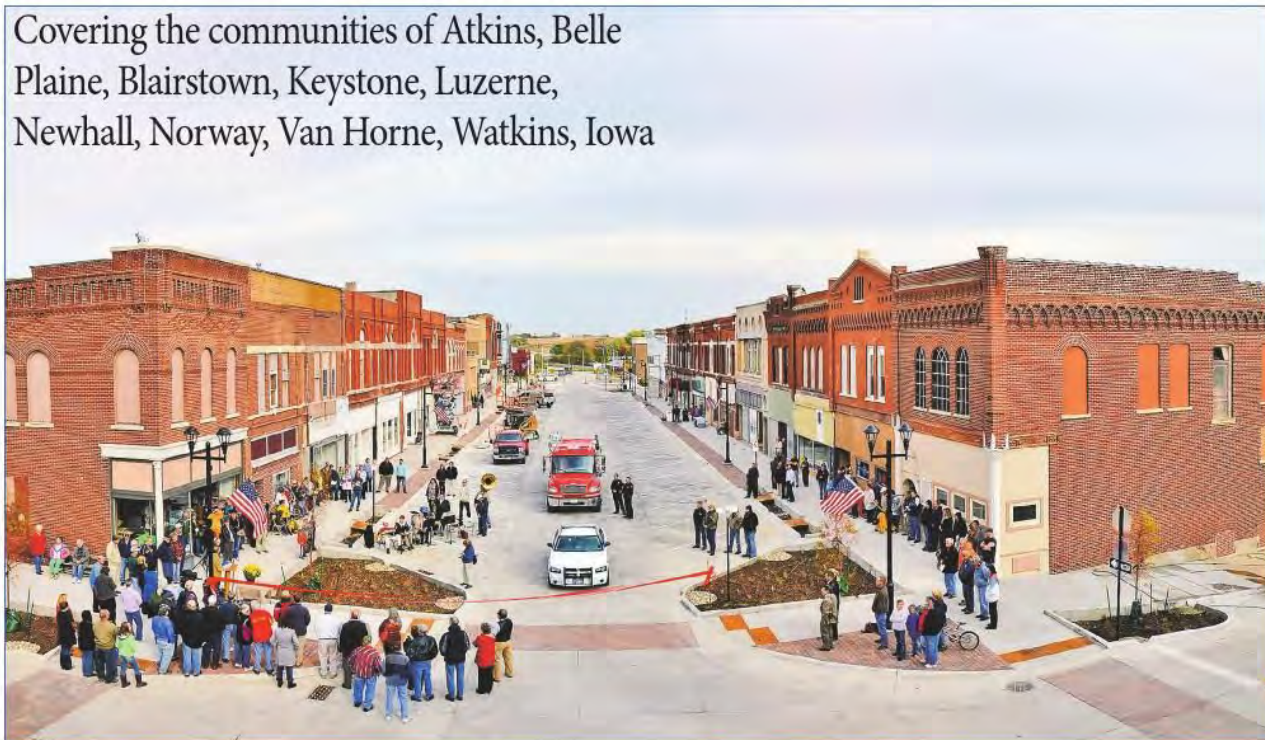

Iowa County Food Bank receives \$10,000 Bayer Fund grant

The Iowa County Food Bank announced last week it received a grant for \$10,000 from Bayer Fund. This grant will not only provide support to the organization, but also increase the number of times per year Iowa County residents may use the Iowa County Food Bank. This grant allows the bank to provide additional food to each client as well as contribute food to the LOVE Network.

"The demand for the Iowa County Food Bank has risen greatly due to inflation," noted food bank officials. "This money will allow us to help Iowa County residents with food insecurity and we are grateful for this grant."

"Throughout the years, the grants given through Bayer Fund have helped strengthen our communities across the United States," said Al Mitchell, President of Bayer Fund. "We're proud to be able to provide support to develop programs like The Iowa County Food Bank that helps combat the critical issue of food insecurity and ultimately helping ensure even more Americans/ the community have access to healthy, nutritious food."

In 2021, Bayer Fund awarded more than \$13.1 million to over 3,400 charitable and nonprofit organizations to help address essential needs in food and nutrition, STEM education and community development. Over the last five years, nonprofit organizations across the U.S. have received more than \$75 million.
