Leaf Vac News Brief and Yard Waste Center Hours



Fall is here and the City of Washington Maintenance and Construction Department will begin leaf pick up October 23 beginning in the northwest quadrant of the City,

moving in a counter-clockwise direction. The leaf vac program will continue until November 23. Residents may place leaves in the terrace area between the sidewalk and the street. Please do not place leaves in the street as this creates drainage and traffic hazards. Questions or comments can be directed to the Maintenance and Construction Department at 319-653-2947.

Leaves and tree trimmings can be hauled to the Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) and Yard Waste Center (YWC) located at 1065 W. Buchanan St.

The YWC is open: Monday though Friday 7 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The following Saturday dates:

Oct. 14, 21, 28 Nov. 4, 11, 18 7 a.m. to 10 a.m.

There are two piles of yard waste. One pile is for tree branches and the other is for yard and garden waste. Please place yard waste in the appropriate pile if you are hauling it yourself. If you bring yard waste in plastic bags, please dump out the contents and take the bags with you. The YWC does not accept lumber or building materials of any type. Please remember, if you didn't grow it, don't throw it!

Reminder: Water Service Line Inventory



The City of Washington is required by the EPA to develop an inventory of our service lines by October 16, 2024. Our inventory needs to include service line material for every address supplied by city water. There are a few ways to get this information to the City of Washington. There is an online survey available at www.washingtoniowa.gov or property owners may call 319-

653-2764 or email us at service-line@washingtoniowa.gov. If service line material is unknown, a photo of the line may be sent via text to 319-653-1531. To locate the service material, locate the water meter, which is typically in the basement or utility closet, and follow the pipe going out of the meter.

With the upcoming Elections; please follow the City guidelines and do not put signs in the City Right of Way. See the following:

165.21 SIGNS.

I. General Provisions

- E.(2) Any existing sign which advertises, promotes, or advocates for an event that occurs on a specific date shall be removed within 14 days after said specific event.
- F. Interference. No billboard, signboard or similar advertising signs shall be located at an intersection so as to obstruct vision, hearing, pedestrian or vehicular safety, or the use and enjoyment of the adjoining property.


3. Signs Permitted in the R-I/R2 District.

C. Small announcement or professional signs, not over six square feet in area, except that an announcement sign or bulletin board not over 18 square feet in area, set back at least 20 feet from any highway, street or road.

Three City Council Seats on November Ballot

Three seats on the Washington City Council will be on the ballot this November. Voters will elect the Ward I and Ward 3 council members, and one atlarge council member. Ward I is the northwest quadrant of the city, and Ward 3 is the southeast quadrant. The positions are four-year terms and will run from 2024 to 2028.

Tuesday, November 7th is Election Day. To vote early or to get additional voting information including voter registration and polling locations, please contact the Washington County Auditor's Office at the county courthouse.

Dispose of the following

- General junk (small loose materials need to be put into cardboard boxes, no bags)
- Bulky furniture items such as couches, mattresses, box springs, recliners - free
- Appliances (\$5 fee)
- Electronics free (except for TV's & Computer monitors they are \$15). Computers & accessories can be taken to Goodwill for free.
- Lawn mowers & lawn equipment must be gas and oil free for disposal

Purchase stickers at City Hall for appliances and TVs or pay in cash at the cleanup site. (No checks or credits cards will be taken at site).

We will **not** accept the following items:

- Household garbage
- Household hazardous waste
- Hazardous materials such as but not limited to explosives, drugs, materials soaked in volatile chemicals
- Tires and waste oil
- Construction materials
- Concrete, brick, and rock
- Latex paint
- Lawn mowers and lawn equipment that are **not** gas and oil free
- Items from outside the Washington City limits
- This is **not** a curbside cleanup. Items left on the curb without proper fees will be subject to penalty.

The City will assist with special pickups for appliances or TVs for those unable to bring them to the site for an additional \$5 fee per item. Contact City Hall at 319-653-6584 by Thursday, October 19 to schedule a pickup. Please have items ready for pickup at your curb by Thursday, October 19.
