#### **Christmas Tree Drop Off and Pickup**

The City has set up a Christmas tree drop off area on the southeast corner of Central Park. It is available through Friday, January 12th.

Residents can put their trees on the street corners opposite of fire hydrants to be picked up January 2 through January 12.

Residents can also haul their trees out to the Waste Water Treatment Plant brush pile site located at 1065 West Buchanan St.

Do <u>not</u> drop off artificial trees and please remove all ornaments.



#### Snow & Ice Removal Ordinance 53.01



Winter is here. Having vehicles off the street during snow storms makes it easier to plow and helps drainage when melting occurs. We are asking residents to please place garbage and recycling carts on the terrace if possible.

When the City removes snow in the downtown area, the permanent signs read: No Parking from 10 pm-6 am for snow removal. The City personnel place four signs on each corner of Central

Park on the days the City will be cleaning.

The City of Washington would like to remind residents that they are responsible for keeping their sidewalks free from snow and ice. The property owner and/or occupant of any building shall clear the public sidewalk of all snow and ice accumulations within 24 hours after the snow has ceased or ice formed. If the property owners and/or occupant fail to remove the ice and snow, the City may do so and the cost of the removal will be levied against the property per Ordinance 53.01.

### **Snow Emergency Ordinance 69.13**

The purpose of Washington's snow emergency ordinance is to limit on-street parking during snow events and any declared snow emergency to give plows access to clear the entire street during winter storms.

Washington City Ordinance 69.13 reads, "Upon the Mayor's declaration of a snow emergency, persons shall comply with the following:

- 1. Residential Areas. No person shall park, abandon, or leave unattended any vehicle on any public street or alley unless the snow has been removed or plowed from the street to each curb edge or alley and the snow has ceased to fall.
- 2. Downtown Area. From 10pm to 6am when signs are posted in the northwest and southeast corners of Central Park no vehicles shall park within the area of the public square and extending one block each way there from, said area bounded by the south line of Second Street, the west line of Second Avenue, the north line of Jefferson Street, and the east line of Avenue B, but not including any portion of Second Street, Second Avenue, Jefferson Street or Avenue B.

The foregoing prohibition shall not apply to the above-described areas during normal business hours of eight o'clock (8:00) A.M. to six o'clock (6:00) P.M. and during normal weekend, evening, or holiday hours."

Snow Emergencies will be relayed to local news media and also publicized on social media. Snow emergencies may be extended or shortened when conditions warrant. Vehicles found parked in violation of the Snow Emergency or Snow Ban Ordinance may be ticketed and/or towed at the owner's expense. Fines for parking violations of Snow Ban and Snow Emergency Ordinances is \$50.

#### **Snow Ban Ordinance 69.12**

### Snow Ban Ordinance from November 1 to April 1.

To allow for the safe initiation and completion of ice and snow removal operations, Washington City Ordinance 69.12 reads "No vehicle shall be left parked, abandoned, or unattended on any street or alley in the City during snow removal operations, or before such operations have removed or cleared accumulated snow or ice from the street to each curb edge or shoulder."

If you utilize the street for parking and you see the street crews are out moving snow, please remove your vehicle from the street so it can be cleared in a safe and timely manner.

The street crew will post signs on the corners of Central Park whenever they plan to do snow removal around the square and the Police Department will also publish this on their Facebook page. The snow ban parking around the square will be handled the same as Thursday night street sweeping - if the signs are posted it will be enforced and as they have tried to do in the past with big snow events, the Police Department may attempt to contact vehicle owners so cars can be moved.
